
Minimum Wages 2019


The very first federal minimum wage was established on October 24, 1938. Here is a graph that shows the minimum wage increases since 1938.

Federal Minimum Wage Increases



Graph below shows **purchasing power** of the federal minimum wage. In 1940, purchasing power of a 40¢ minimum wage was worth \$7.13 when compared to value of money in 2018.

This means that a worker could spend 40ϕ in a store in 1940, and buy items (or have **purchasing power**) equal to \$7.13 in a store in 2018. In 1970, a worker could spend the \$1.60 minimum wage (for one hour of work) in a store, and buy items (have **purchasing power**) equal to \$10.49 in a store in 2018. When store prices go up (called inflation), your purchasing power goes down. Some think that when store prices go up (inflation), minimum wage needs to go up also — so workers keep same purchasing power. What happens if store prices go up (inflation), but minimum wage does not go up? This happened since 1970 (see arrow).
